The Silent Killer

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Introduction

Imagine. Waking up every morning hoping you will not have one of those days that force you not go to work. Suddenly, you have a sharp pain in your stomach, not being able to move. For some people, every morning they wake with a high chance this will happen. These people are living with Hepatitis C, also known as the silent killer. It is called the silent killer because you can be living with this and not know you have it until later in your life. About 150 million people are chronically infected with this disease. In the world, about 350 thousand people die every year from Hepatitis C related causes.

That is why Hepatitis C should be considered a bigger issue. Hepatitis C is a disease which primarily affects the liver. Hepatitis C is a serious disease because the liver is needed to remove toxins that build up in the blood. Hepatitis C can destroy the liver and cause cirrhosis and death. It is the main cause of liver transplants in the world.

Explain Issue

Hepatitis C is a disease which kills many people every year. Hepatitis C is a form of viral hepatitis transmitted in infected blood, causing chronic liver disease. You cannot get hepatitis C from casual contact such as hugging, sneezing, coughing, or sharing food or water with someone. You can get hepatitis C if you come into contact with the blood of someone who has hepatitis C.The most common way to get hepatitis C is by sharing needles and other equipment. Before 1991, people could get hepatitis C through blood transfusions and organ transplants. Since 1991, all donated blood and organs are screened for hepatitis C. Now it is rare to get the disease this way.

Hepatitis C affects people both locally and globally. About 3.2 million Americans are infected with hepatitis C. Studies show that about ½ to ¾ of infected adults are unaware they have the disease. Also, Hepatitis C now kills more people in the US than HIV. But, this is only how it affects us here. Every year, 3 – 4 million people are infected with the Hepatitis C virus. More than 350 000 people die from hepatitis C-related causes every year. So, this means about 15% of the people who become infected every year pass away.

People say many different things about Hepatitis C. When some people here about Hepatitis C they do not think much of it. Most people have never even heard of it. When I started my project on Hepatitis C, I made a survey which I then sent to some people. Most people had

never even heard of Hepatitis C. This showed me Hepatitis C needed a lot more awareness.

Current Events

Recently India, Egypt, and Brazil have secured access to Sovaldi, an incredibly effective and expensive Hepatitis C treatment, for one percent of its cost in America. This 12-week treatment program that runs U.S. insurance companies \$84,000 per cycle, will be just \$840 in these nations. Burma, Kenya, Mozambique, and Iran will pay slightly more. They will pay \$900 for the full treatment program, or 1.1 percent of the standard price. So what determines who gets a discount and who doesn't? Their global pricing model is based on a country's ability to pay. So, this means countries who have limited funds will pay less. This will insure more people get their necessary medication.

People in countries such as these are benefitting a lot because of this. Now some people infected with HCV that could not afford treatment can now afford it. However, while the countries that most need and cannot afford the drug were greatly helped, many other nations may not be able to negotiate such as low price. So, people from wealthier countries will have to pay a lot more to receive their treatment, even if some people can not afford it. Therefore, not all people have access to their necessary treatment.

Methods of Change

Currently, there are many organizations that are helping this issue, both locally and globally. For example, The American Liver Foundation is a non-profit organization that promotes liver health and disease prevention. The mission of the ALF is to facilitate, advocate, and promote education and support and research for prevention, treatment and cure of liver disease. Another organization helping this issue is the Greenview Foundation, a charity raising money for medical research on this disease with the hopes to improve the diagnosis and education of Hepatitis C patients all around the world.

The American Liver Foundation hosts various events to raise money for Hepatitis C research. They also work hard to create more awareness to not only Hepatitis C, but also many liver diseases.
